Remember the 3 types of items:

- 1. Rating scales
  - e.g., "Rate the extent to which you agree with each of the following potential concerns regarding AI."
    - Strongly Agree <-> Strongly Disagree
  - "Matrix scale" in Qualtrics
- 2. Ranking activities
  - o e.g., "Put the following potential concerns regarding AI in order from most to least important."
  - o "Rank Order" in Qualtrics
- 3. Open response
  - o e.g., "Describe your three biggest concerns regarding AI."
  - o "Text Entry" in Qualtrics
